	<b>"New regulations provide an alternative procedure for making byelaws</b> The <u>Byelaws (Alternative Procedure) (England) Regulations 2015</u> have been published by DCLG. They were approved by Parliament in accordance with section 236A(5) of the Local Government Act 1972 and are due to come into force on 1 October 2015.			
	Under section 236 of LGA 1972, byelaws need to be confirmed by the Secretary of State before they enter into force. The regulations establish the types of byelaws to which section 236 will not apply and provide an alternative procedure for the making, entering into force and revocation of such byelaws. The alternative procedure requires local authorities, prior to making a byelaw, to undertake a 'deregulatory assessment', including consulting those affected by or likely to be affected by the byelaw. The deregulatory assessment must then be submitted, together with the draft byelaw, to the Secretary of State for leave to proceed. If leave is granted, the local authority can then proceed to make the byelaw, but will require approval from the community, rather than the Secretary of State.			
	The distinguishing feature of the alternative procedure provided by the new regulations is to enable local authorities to resolve any objections and enter into force byelaws locally, by removing the need for central government confirmation.

#### **APPENDIX 1 Report from Cnty Cllr Mrs Dean**

## Councillors Report September 2015-09-07

1. Areas of Search TMBC Local Development Framework.

The areas suggested by developers as suitable for residential development have been published on the Borough Council website. (Go to TMBC, then Planning, then call for sites, then scroll down to map and enlarge.) They include

almost all land south of A20 London Rd from Brickfields east to Town Hill, Banky Meadows, part of Forty Acre Field which is the land between the bypass and Winterfield Lane. Land opposite the Village Hall, Appledene, land land between Fartherwell Road and its junction with Sandy Lane washing across to the

Village Hall and around Fartherwell Avenue and Ewell Avenue to Offham Road.

The Strawberry field to the south of Churchfields up to Manor Farm, parts of Manor Farm through to St Leonards Street and St Leonards Tower.

Eden Farm and land in Lavenders Rd and Lucks Hill which were the subject of recent planning applications. East Malling and Larkfield Parish Council have written to Tracey Crouch MP expressing their concern that the green space between East and West Malling may be 'watered down'.

2. The Joint Parish/Borough Parking Steering Group is programmed to take place on November 11<sup>th</sup> to review the conclusion of the consultation exercise. I have written twice to Andy Bracey asking for a meeting prior to consultation in order that all local members can see the paperwork which will be issued, and discuss arrangements for the exhibition. I have so far had a reply only indicating that this would be difficult to fit in to the timetable of meetings.

3... Licences

a. The Fancy Goat is understood to be considering appealing against their Licence restrictions.

b. I have received complaints about activities at The Lobster Pot, particularly late night noise and referred this to Anthony Garnett at the Borough Council.

4. Compensation for closure

have sent details of the utility company compensation schemes to those businesses who may have lost trade. It is unusual for the utility companies to pay out, but we were assured by SGN that they do make payments. 5. Flooding in St Leonards Street. The

expansion in the pipework under St Leonards Street to increase the flow into the Country Park is programmed to take place on September 21st. It was delayed whilst the closure for the gas works were in place

.6. Parking Problems at W Malling Co E Primary School I am meeting with the Head Teacher at the Primary School tomorrow to discuss our concerns about parking and anti social behaviour during the summer.

7. Street Lighting restoration of all night lighting and conversion contract.

I am meeting with the Head of Highways tomorrow to discuss the position with regard to KCC Street Lighting conversion to LED and the process to restore all night lighting where requested.

KCC is to contact all Parish Councils for details of the street lighting columns, and it has been confirmed that KCC will allow Parish Councils to join their contract for conversion to LED. It is not clear whether that involves also being part of the central management system.

Restoration of all night lighting has been confined to a very small number of requests mainly where the original criteria were wrongly applied. This process has been augmented by two new criteria to include dark alleyways, or paths where there is a concern for pedestrian safety, such as where steps exist, Any requests coming from the Police will also be accepted.

In West Malling I have had requests for restoration of all night lighting from residents in Sandown Road, and Meadow Bank. If there are any other areas where there are concerns, please let me know.

8.. Devolution of powers to local government.

has not indicated by the Government deadline any wish to apply for devolved powers. This is surprising as all parties backed this in a motion earlier this year.

9. Rocks Road Closure

Rocks Rd East Malling will be closed for up to 12 days for water maintenance work.

10 .High Street East Malling Closure for Gas Main works

SGN have requested a four week over run on their five week contract through East Malling, citing problems with the weather and the presence of unexpected amounts of ragstone. Since this work should ideally take place in school holidays, it may be subject to lengthy delays.

### Anti-social behaviour and other incidents of note

Anti- social behaviour is on the increase in west Malling , but in the majority of cases it is in and around the Norman Road area, and the reason for this is that, youths from other areas are meeting up with local youths and hanging around the area, especially now during school summer break. Moped riders have been given Section 59's, some youths have been charged with criminal damage and others have been given verbal warnings and taken home by Police. Data act does not allow details to be given.

## ASB REPORT FROM MS Marlor – 17 July 2015

Provided by <u>*RedSnapper Group*</u> training, this was a comprehensive look at the Anti-social Behaviour, Crime & Policing Act 2014 and was based on <u>Home Office guidance</u>

This guidance is easy to read and (surprisingly for a Home Office document!!) informative! Although it has to be stressed that the guiding premise behind this legislation was to allow local authorities to formulate the finer details themselves; the theory being that this would make the legislation more adaptable to the individual situation and thus, easier and simpler to use. This Act is certainly less prescriptive than previous attempts but this means that until local authorities have case law from testing their actions in the courts, many are loathe to take action and risk (financial)

penalty if they get it wrong! As a Parish Council we would take action through the Borough Council and the Community Safety Partnership.

### Summary

- Community trigger: gives communities the right to request a review of their case and prompt "joined-up" approach from the community safety partnership agencies;
- Community remedy: gives victims a say in the out of court punishment;
- Civil injunction: replaces the ASBO;
- Dispersal power: can be used to remove a person from a specific area for up to 48 hours without previous designation as a dispersal zone;
- Community protection notice: used to stop a person or business committing ASB;
- Public spaces protection order: what it says!
- Closure power: for premises or properties that are causing ASB/nuisance (the old "crack house" power).

### Age Concern Malling Report to West Malling Parish Council

Through our services at Age Concern Malling we continue to ensure that isolated and infirm older people can be independent and are able to continue to live in their own homes. Information and Advice is an essential service enabling clients to access services and resources to maintain that independence. Dedicated Dementia Day Care services are offered at Rotary House, West Malling and Day Care in East Malling, Addington West Malling and Walderslade. A total of 520 Day Care Sessions were held over the period 2014/15, providing 10,396 individual Day Care opportunities. The Day Care service offers clients the opportunity to socialise, make friends and engage in numerous activities including seated exercise classes, guizzes and entertainment. Foot care, hairdressing and bathing services are available at Rotary House. Over the course of the year there were many opportunities to go on outings. Many of the clients utilising Age Concern Services would not be able to attend without assisted transport. As such transport is an essential component of service provision. The transport service is a life line in reducing isolation and maintaining independent living. The Age Concern Services aim to reduce emergency admissions to hospital and delay the need for residential care provision. The majority of the transport trips include escorts to ensure the safety and wellbeing of the clients, many of whom require assistance in moving from their accommodation to the transport. The Transport is not only moving an individual from point A to B, it is the experience itself, being in the company of others and enjoying the journey and the surroundings. Such journeys stimulate conversation and reminisces.

For the relatives and carers of many of our clients, utilising the services at Age Concern Malling, gives vital respite from caring duties and the opportunity of personal time.

In the current climate of fiscal restraint, Age Concern Malling is determined to continue to provide vital services to older people. We also hope to extend the Dementia Day Care to weekends in order to provide much needed support.
